hile women have gained greater access to education at all levels, they have not yet reached parity with men in fields of science and technology. This was the gist of a 15 days UGC sponsored course on the topic "Women and Technology" organised from 21st January to 4th February, 2013. The course enabled the students to understand the factors and circumstances due to which women are not able to excel and participate in the field of science and technology and what can be done to improve the situation. About 60 students attended the course.

The course was divided into five modules 1)Introduction to Women's Role in Technology

2) Gender Differences (Participation and Usage of Technology) 3) Gender Issues - Problems of Women at IT Workplace 4) Mainstreaming Women in Science and Technology and 5) IT and Women.

Dr Madhu Gupta, Former Director, Centre for Women Studies, GGM Science College, was the resource person for the first two modules. She described that women in the 16th, 17th



and 19th century were associated with the field of science and invention despite odd conditions of that time and how they excelled in these fields.

Prof. Indu Gandotra, Assistant Professor, Model Institute of Engineering and Technology, while taking up third and fourth modules, explained how "Machismo" attached with long working hours in the technology sector deters women's career advancement. She also explained a term "Ghetoization" which is a case in which women and men in the s a m e occupation hold different titles,



ranks and pay structures. Such factors act as barriers to the career development of women. She suggested ways to mainstream women in the technology sector by modifying the occupational culture which would enable utilization of women as important economic and technical resources.

Dr. Pragaya Khanna, Professor, Government College for Women, Parade took up the fifth module. She stressed that women aspirants must develop in themselves certain skills namely, skills of data analysis, presentation, communication and business skills.

The students were also made familiar with certain measures which are required to motivate women such as increase in capacity, increase in education and also increase in schemes floated by the government. Dr. Naheed Soz, Managing Director Women Development Corporation, Jammu and Kashmir awarded certificates to the participants on the completion of the course.

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ORIENTATION PROGRAMME

ffective Time Management is considered important for success in both personal and professional lives. An orientation programe on "Importance of Time Management for Women" was organized on 14th January, 2013 for all faculty members of the college. Ms Jasleen Mohial, Coordinator, Model Academy - The Prestigious School of MIER was the resource person.

Her presentation started with self assessment analysis on time management in which participants were asked to fill a questionnaire and then rate themselves on the scale of 1-10. She beautifully applied the skill of story telling, through which time management skills such as cohesiveness, negotiation, creating opportunities, clarity etc. were discussed. She explained the difference between being efficient and effective and how both these techniques should be aimed at getting maximum productivity. Time Management measures such as preparation of - To Do List, Goal Setting, Proactiveness, Prioritization etc. were also explained.

Certain time wasters such as telephone calls, visitors, meetings, lack of communication, unorgainised desk, etc. were also highlighted. She stressed upon the need

to do SWOT analysis. The participants were asked to analyze their strengths and weaknesses and learn the importance to say no to any unwanted task or event. She also advised them to do the difficult tasks first and then aim for



trivial things and avoid wasting time on petty issues. There was an active involvement of the participants who also gave their views. Everyone appreciated the efforts of the centre in organizing such a programme.

EXTENTION LECTURES



n extension lecture was organized on 19th September, 2012 on the topic "Women and Social Taboos". The resource person for the lecture was Dr Abha Chuhan HOD, Department of

Women and Social Taboos

was Dr Abha Chuhan HOD, Department of Sociology, University of Jammu. Dr. Chuhan observed that there are many socio-cultural taboos being practiced against women right from their birth to death. She said that women are a marginalized section of society and taboos can go to extremes. Many a time these prove physically, mentally and emotionally taxing for women.

Some of the taboos are also formed due to

biological differences among men and women. She said that economic empowerment of women would eventually help in minimizing some of these social taboos. She further said that empowerment alone will give courage to women to break free from the chains of limiting beliefs, patterns and societal or religious conditions that have traditionally kept women suppressed and unable to realize their true potential. The session was followed by discussion during which the participants put forth their queries.

Woman as a Working Parent



he centre organized an extension lecture on the topic "Woman as a Working Parent" on 17th November, 2012. The resource person for the lecture was Mrs. Sarita Chauhan Rana (IAS), Vice Chairperson, Jammu Development Authority. In her lecture she observed that women have become more active, independent and are balancing their lives remarkably as successful working women and as caring parents. She further said working women are more confident, have a higher sense of self esteem, a greater sense of personal competence and autonomy.

She illustrated certain portions from the

constitution which focus on the rights of women, her beliefs, her right to justice, personal and social advantages. Disadvantages of being a working woman parent were also discussed. She stressed that every woman must focus on herself. If she does justice to herself she can do justice towards others. She cautioned participants that even though a woman is expected to do multitasking, she must not think that she is a super woman. At the end of the session queries of the participants were answered by the resource person.

Sharing of Experiences with women achievers happens to be a regular feature of the SSGCWS. Dr. Naheed Soz, Managing Director, Jammu and Kashmir Women Development Corporation(JKWDC) visited the college to share her experiences with the students and members of staff. These included Micro Financing-Entrepreneurship Development, Special Package for Promotion of Girl Child, Rural Health Mission, Incentives for Women etc. An interactive session followed after the lecture. Her message to the young teacher trainees' was that every woman must take a stand for herself and try to be victorious against odds.

FAMOUS INDIAN WOMEN WRITERS

Indian women writers have garnered critical praise for their scintillating literary prowess and making social issues a key part of their work. Indian women authors writing in English have earned international renown.

ARUNDHATI ROY made headlines around the world when she became the first Indian woman to win a Man Booker prize for her debut novel, 'The God of Small Things' (1997). In the decade following that momentous achievement, Roy has become an ardent

advocate of social and economic justice for the country's oppressed minorities. She was awarded the Sahitya Akademi Award for her collection of essays on contemporary issues 'The Algebra of Infinite Justice' in 2006.

One of the well known writers in

India, SHASHI DESHPANDE has

written books for both children

and adults, for over thirty years

now. She has penned nine novels, a number of short stories, children's

books and several discerning essays. Her novel, 'That Long Silence', won the Sahitya Akademi Award in 1990. Trained as a journalist, Deshpande's work focuses on the reality and truth of the lives of Indian women. She received the Padma Sri award in 2009.

One of India's most prolific novelists, ANITA DESAI is a veteran in the writing field. She has been short listed three times for the Booker Prize. For her idyllic prose novel 'The Village by the Sea,' Desai won the Guardian Children's Fiction Prize in 1983. She was honored with a Sahitya Akademi Award for her novel

'Fire on the Mountain' in 1978. Along with being a novelist, Desai is also the Emeritus John E. Burchard Professor of Humanities at the Institute of Technology at Massachusetts.

The Indian author, KIRAN DESAL is one of the most celebrated authors in the country, since her novel 'The Inheritance of Loss' won the 2006 Man Booker Prize. The novel was also awarded the National Book Critics Circle Fiction

Award. Her first book 'Hullabaloo in the Guava Orchard,' a novel, published in 1998 has received rave reviews and won the Betty Trask Award, a prize awarded by the Society of Authors for new novels by citizens under the age of 35 of the Commonwealth Nations.
