


Chart-1 depicts the course-wise classification of student respondents. Students from B.Ed. programme were the major contributors of the feedback. 65.43% responses were received from them.




Chart-2 depicts session-wise student responses. Students of session-2019-21 were the major contributors of the feedback.



























# 16. MAJOR OBSERVATIONS/SUGGESTIONS AND ACTION TAKEN:

S.No.	Observations/Suggestions	Action Taken
1.	It was observed that 73 % of the students agreed that the curriculum had been able to generate high level of interest in the subject area.	Changes/ mid-course corrections were made in the curriculum to keep abreast with current trends in education and global standards. This was done with the objective of increasing the overall satisfaction rate of the students with curriculum and further increasing their level of interest in the subject area.
2.	It was also observed that 74 % of the students had responded that the curriculum for the programme of study had helped them to gain meaningful and enriching experiences.	The college has adopted a regular in house practice of planning, reviewing and revising the curriculum so that the students are given opportunities to demonstrate knowledge and skills related to various learning areas. They are also motivated to develop professional acumen from a wide range of curricular experiences, gained during the programme of study.
3.	It was found a few students were not satisfied with the lack of availability of multiple copies/volumes of the books prescribed in the curriculum in the college library.	The librarian was asked to prepare a list of books that were frequently issued by students. Order was placed for procuring more copies of the listed books so that multiple copies of the same book are available and can be issued to the students.
